2021 National Teacher of the Year

Juliana Urtubey, NBCT, a first-generation, bilingual immigrant, loved school. Drawn to teaching through a high school teacher leadership academy, she knew it would be important to be a bilingual teacher. Now the 2021 National Teacher of the Year, Juliana works to serve as a mirror for her school community, helping students to be proud of their identities and their families, and to acknowledge their strengths and contributions to the community.

Juliana, currently in her 11th year in the classroom, teaches at Kermit R. Booker, Sr. Innovative Elementary School in Las Vegas, where she serves as a co-teacher in pre-kindergarten through fifth-grade special education settings and as an instructional strategist developing supports to meet students' differing academic, social-emotional, and behavioral needs.

As National Teacher of the Year, Juliana plans to advocate for a "joyful and just education" for all students, one that is inclusive and celebratory of all students' identities, families and communities. Urtubey is the first Latinx National Teacher of the Year since at least 2005.

Juliana is a National Board Certified Teacher and holds a bachelor's degree in bilingual elementary education and a master's degree in special bilingual education from the University of Arizona. She is a National Board for Professional Teaching Standards Board of Directors member and Teacher Fellow, a Nevada Teach Plus Senior Policy Fellow, and an Understood Teacher Fellow and mentor. She is also a winner of the 2018 Rogers Foundation Heart of Education award.

Juliana (HOO-lee-on-a ER-two-bay) enjoys reading in Spanish and traveling, and has had the opportunity to teach in Ecuador, Mexico, Spain and Puerto Rico. She also enjoys tending to her collection of house plants and spending time outdoors, and she aims to visit all the National Parks. Juliana lives in Las Vegas with her husband, Olmeca, and their dogs Chenek, Chima, and Piolin.

Presented by: In The Morning Meeting book, the authors explain that every child deserves to hear their name said with respect and warmth. This presentation will focus on how to create this space for all students and build competence for independ- ence in the process. We will explore how students need the opportunity to practice social skills in a safe, structured space, before we ask them to generalize these skills to aca- demic tasks, like group work. This space, can help to build social competence, which as we will discuss later, is a key component of independence. We will model and participate in sev- eral aspects of a community meeting and help iden- tify how this might look for all learners.	Description: They say, "The best resource in the school is the teacher next door." The first year of teaching can be daunting and it takes a lot of courage to ask for help. Fortunately, new teachers are surrounded by expertstheir colleagues! This session will help new and aspiring teachers know where to find help when they need it most. Building Identity through Place & Storytelling: Educator Rising Student Journeys in Art and Education

Presented by: Pam Remstein, Gigi Yu; University of New Mexico **Audience:** All Students

Description: This presentation reflects a collaboration between UNM Art Education. UNM Taos College of Education, and New Mexico Educators Rising, and teacher leaders and two students from diverse high schools, in a project sponsored by UNM Center for Regional Studies. Through the study of New Mexico's rich cultural and artistic resources, the NM Educator Rising teachers and students interact with New Mexico artists and cultural workers, in an effort to provoke their own thinking about the relationship between creative and artistic processes and teaching and learning. Through virtual participatory workshops with students from two New Mexico (NM) Educator Rising communities, each artist/cultural worker shares a personal story that connects their identity and work to NM culture, identity, and place. The goal of this project is to equip upcoming educators to consider teaching as dynamic, integrated, and creative, while connecting to New Mexico's rich cultural and artistic resources.

The project aims to support the high-need for educators in our NM school systems by partnering with NM Educators Rising, creating a direct link between future teachers to UNM's art education and classroom teacher preparation programs. NM Ed Rising students and teacher leaders engage with provocations that relate artistic thinking and culture and encourage awareness of the relationship between one's identity and being a teacher.



TASC Standards: a Framework for Student-Centered Pedagogy

Presented by: Dr. Kathleen Wagner, Olivia Daniels; Rubeli Alvarez; Eastern New Mexico University Audience: EdRising High School/Collegiate Students

Description: The Interstate Teaching Assessment and Support Consortium (InTASC) provides teaching standards that promote engaging learning environments for all students. The InTASC Standards serve as competencies for teachers in New Mexico and require teachers to use studentcentered pedagogy to create meaningful learning experiences for all students. This hands-on session will begin by introducing participants to the InTASC Standards, which are divided into four categories: 1) The Learner and Learning, 2) Content, 3) Instructional Practice, and 4) Professional Responsibility. Participants then will analyze the standards by determining what successful classrooms would look like, sound like, and feel like when the InTASC Standards are achieved. Social and emotional learning will be emphasized as participants explore standards. The session will feature collaboration among participants to reflect on their own practice during Educators Rising experiences. Finally, the session will conclude with a debriefing of the InTASC Standards and how they promote student-centered pedagogy so that teachers can meet the needs of all students.


